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Pastor's Report

"If my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven, and I will forgive their sin and will heal their land." (2 Chronicles 7:14).

As you read through the reports in this booklet, you will find plenty of inspiration to praise God, who has been ever faithful to us and is clearly at work amongst us. But I pray that you will also find much to inspire your intercession and to give you confidence to cry out to God for more. For, as per the prophecy we were given some years ago inspired by a century-old wisteria plant at Eltham Palace, I believe the best is yet to come for Trinity.

Staff recruitment has dominated this year. Good administration is vital for the effective work of the church, but sadly often goes unnoticed until something goes wrong. So, I would like to take this opportunity to say a huge thank you to Kerry O'Sullivan for her fifteen years of faithful and proficient service as our Administrator. Thank you, also, to Geraldine Alliston, Louise Brady, Jill Holland and Caz Kirby-Smith for their service in covering the work while we recruited a replacement (we also used this time to redesign a mobile-friendly newsletter, which is a part of our communications overhaul, in which Karen Thatcher continues to assist us). I'm sure you will agree that Alice Costar has made an excellent start, already bringing some helpful fresh ideas as our new Administrator. I encourage you to get to know her, not just as our Administrator, but as a friend.

Whilst the process to recruit a paid Youth Leader (in partnership with CRiBS) has been, at times, painfully slow, we believe that it has led us to absolutely the right person in Isaac Givens and we are excited by the prospect of him joining us from Texas. As I write, we have been accepted as a sponsoring organisation and are awaiting guidance as to how to complete the next steps. Leaving his family and culture behind in the USA will be a huge change, so again, it is vital that we surround Isaac with friendship and support, as well as a committed team of proactive YP Workers, who will share the burden of the work. We particularly need female Workers, not least because Lorraine Sansom has given notice of her need to step down from <u>YP</u> in September. We give her our sincere thanks for staying on a year longer than planned to see us through this academic year.

It was truly wonderful to baptise Emmanuel Wachira and Lizzie Hall on Easter Sunday, and I know that many of you were touched by their testimonies! I maintain that a church our size ought to be seeing far more baptisms each year than we do, so I urge you to join me in praying for this. For more news of our efforts in <u>outreach and evangelism</u>, please see my separate report later in this booklet.

Another highlight was how well we engaged with the Bible in One Year programme. It does not matter whether or not we completed the whole Bible last year; what matters is that people have been *enjoying* a healthy habit of *daily Bible reading*, reading the *whole* counsel of God, and *talking to one another* about their readings. I pray we will continue these good habits in 2024, whether through this or a different Bible-reading programme, but for more information of this programme, please visit: https://bibleinoneyear.org/en/.

My 'What's The Point Of Reading ...?' preaching series was also designed to aid this habit, by exploring the key messages of several books of the Bible. This was again complemented wonderfully by our team of preachers, and by our increasingly excellent allage services (everywhere I visit, people are praising what our <u>Children's Leader</u>, Debs Harmer, does – of which this is the most visible element)!

Our grateful thanks, too, for the teams who continue to provide our excellent children's and youth ministries, from Crèche and Trinity Tots, through GodZone, to YP. God continues to answer our prayers for more children, especially young children, and it was a particular joy for me to be able to bless three new babies this year – one at a naming ceremony at home, and my first blessing of twins in church!

At the other end of the spectrum, it is always an honour to walk with people through their grief, which in this last year included conducting funeral services for Brian Stapley and Alan Abernethy. This leads me on to pastoral care, the need for which seems to be ever increasing. I am indebted to our <u>Pastoral Care Assistant</u>, Janet Grist, and the group of volunteers who regularly visit or support the neediest in the fellowship, which frees me to be available for a much wider scope of pastoral care as needs arise.

We are conscious of increasing needs, which will likely further increase in the coming years, and also that some of our most stalwart carers may themselves be more in need of care as they age. So, there is a need to bolster our Pastoral Care Team in order to support Janet in ensuring regular visits to the elderly and those in greatest need among us. We are also looking to establish a Pastoral Care Network to better support the whole congregation, with the aim that each Network Leader will touch base semi-regularly with a specified list of people (this would be a lighter role than the Pastoral Care Team). Thank you to those who have already offered to help and I will be contacting you again in due course. We are still in need of more help, too. But we want to launch this well with good training, which I am still sourcing / adapting to our needs (other pressing needs having limited the time I could give to this thus far).

<u>Small Group</u> Leaders will automatically become Pastoral Care Network Leaders for their small group. We are grateful for their dedication to this task. Small Groups are a brilliant way to meet people, make closer friendships, and support one another as Christians; so please speak to Jill Holland or to me if you are interested in joining a group, or if you could help host / lead a new group. I have loved getting to know more about the different home cultures represented within Trinity (and sampling the food), through our Cultural Prayers Evenings. Our thanks to all who have led a session and to Caz Kirby-Smith for the initiative. Likewise, we are very much benefitting from hearing from our sent / partner missionaries through our Zoom Prayers. Prayer meetings happen twice monthly, at 8pm on Wednesdays: one by Zoom and the other in person (details are always in the newsletter). I strongly urge you to join in these corporate acts of prayer for the work of the gospel and the church.

All this helps to make Trinity a family, as have our church lunches and the various Trinity Family Events (which have always been wonderful occasions, if sometimes sparsely attended). Similarly, I have been delighted by the harmonious and conscientious engagement with some important issues in our Church Members' Meetings. Disagreement sharpens our discernment of God's will for his church, but *how* we disagree is even more important.

Wider afield, please pray for healing within the Baptist Union of Great Britain from a painful, uncertain and divisive two-year consultation period, following a request to remove the bar on Baptist Ministers living in active same-sex relationships. Effectively this would have redefined the Union's definition of marriage by the back door, and so I am personally relieved that BUGB Council voted in March to uphold the existing bar. However, this is unlikely to be the end of the issue, so please pray for wisdom for our leaders as they deal with the fall-out, including the London Baptist Association Regional team and our own Regional Minister, Claire Nicholls. How easy it is to be distracted from the call to make and grow disciples for Jesus Christ!

Returning to Trinity, I am excited by the many ways in which this booklet demonstrates our commitment to preaching and living the gospel of Jesus Christ, and I commend these reports for your perusal and prayers of gratitude, as well as thanking everyone who has played their part in the life of the church this year.

However, we must not become complacent. Rather, we should use what has gone before as inspiration to earnestly seek *further growth*. There remains so much to be done. Oncegreat Britain is now a very far cry from the godly nation it claimed to be, and we can never be content when thousands upon thousands of residents of Bexley Borough know nothing of our glorious Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ. The challenge is that every revival in history has been preceded by both a concerted dedication to *prayer* on the part of God's people and a passionate recommitment to *holiness*.

This is the "If... then" of our verse for the year. "If my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves [submit to God's ways] and pray and [earnestly] seek my face and turn [repent] from their wicked ways ... then I will hear from heaven, and I will forgive their sin and will heal their land." The vision is far more than a thriving church; it is societal transformation. Let us each regularly examine our ways to check that they are in line with God's revealed Word; and let us pray earnestly, individually and together, for a wide awakening to a living faith in Jesus Christ and for consequent societal transformation in this borough, this land and beyond; and let us go on praying for it for as long as it takes for those prayers to be answered. Amen?

Pastoral Assistant's Report

I continue to be committed to my role as Pastoral Care Assistant. I have really valued the support of others in the church, who have visited the housebound or supported them in other ways such as accompanying them on hospital appointments.

My role is to oversee and provide both spiritual and practical support for folk who are vulnerable, in need of extra attention or struggling with mental health issues. Sometimes a 'listening ear' or a phone call is all that is needed. Communication is a key element in my role, which means that it is essential I am kept in the loop by those who are supporting others. We continue with the 'Deliveroo' of cakes and scones to our housebound family where possible, and I know this is much appreciated.

I attend a weekly Pastoral meeting with Andy and a Deacon. We spend that updating any information on church family members, discussing and praying for any needs and any further input that may be needed. I also attend a weekly Staff Meeting. As mentioned in previous reports, I still find <u>Oasis</u> a good source of news / needs of our church family.

I am involved, along with others, in the monthly visit to St Margaret's Care Home, where we present a 'light' service, consisting of singing, a gospel talk and prayers. This is one of the 'highs' of my role, to see the impact that even this short time spent with these vulnerable people can make. Thank you, St Margaret's, for inviting us.

I would like to give a special 'Thank you' to Elaine Camp, who has been there to encourage me, especially during any 'low' times, and has helped me to maintain 'me' and my sense of humour and smile.

My vision is that eventually the church members will be able to provide the support and expertise etc for the most needy in church, so that the role of Pastoral Assistant can be made redundant. Children's Leader's Report

Crèche

Our Crèche is available on a Sunday for our youngest children from birth to the age of three. Sarah Mills leads the team, which includes Cynthia Osei-Kwame, Anne Linley, Ciku Nyandusi, Hilda Agyeman, Catherine Gould, Linda Brady and Shola Bamisaye. The team set up a range of activities for the children to play with during the service and do the valuable job of giving parents the chance to sit in the service, without worrying about entertaining their young ones. This year has seen a rise in numbers; please pray that our numbers grow even more in the coming year.

GodZone

Trinity is very blessed to have a huge number of children attend each week and I love to see the stream of children and young people head out to their groups each week.

On a Sunday morning, we split into different groups and meet in the halls at the back of the building. Alpha and Beta are currently still joined together and the combined group is led by Debs Harmer and Etty Haworth, with help from Adam Harmer, Fiona Banks, Elaine Camp and Eileen Jones. Each week we learn more about the Bible through stories, songs, games and craft. Our numbers can vary greatly from week to week, but we always have lots of fun whether there are 3 or 13 of us!

Gamma meets in the middle hall and are led by Claire Altman and Sadye Kemp, with help from Angela Roach and Libby Isaac. This group is for children in school years 3 to 5 and they explore the Bible through activities based on the Scripture Union resources. The group are keen to offer their thoughts and opinions and especially love exploring Bible stories through drama.

Delta meets in the upstairs classroom and is led by Kerry Ann Reid and Gareth Roach with help from Kerry O'Sullivan and Chidi Emodi. The children move into Delta in Year 6 and stay here until they move into YP in Year 9. The children are encouraged to think more deeply about Bible stories and really consider how they can apply what they are learning to their own lives. They are a great group who always impress me with their Bible knowledge when I cover Delta and who usually challenge me with their questions too!

All that happens in GodZone on a Sunday is only possible because of the brilliant team I have supporting me. I want to thank them for all their energy and the time they regularly give, as I know many of them have busy jobs too. Thank you to Mandy Card, Paul Bryant and Monica Benson who are our emergency helpers and step in to cover at short notice. I would also like to thank Beth Kemp and Victoria Oluwafemi, who have stepped down from the team in the last year – your contribution to GodZone is really appreciated.

GodZone camp took place at Carroty Wood in June, when we took 30 children to Tonbridge and spent a very hot and sunny weekend having fun together and learning more about God. The weekend is a great opportunity for the children to spend an extended period of time together and it was brilliant to see existing friendships deepening and new ones being formed. Our talks focused on the theme 'One Way', where we explored how Jesus is the way, the truth and the life. It was great to see the children thinking carefully about what they heard and to have the opportunity to discuss this further and answer some of their questions during our group discussion times. I am deep in preparations for this 2024's camp and I would appreciate your prayers for another successful weekend.

This year has seen fewer family events than usual, as we evaluate the best way to move forward with these. We enjoyed a picnic at the manse, a light party and a New Year's Eve party. If you would like to get involved in planning and running a family event, then please get in touch.

I continue to feel incredibly grateful to work with our GodZone children and have the opportunity to lead them closer to God. We have an amazing group of children who are lots of fun to spend time with and who regularly impress me with their knowledge and skills in many areas. I would encourage you to pray for them as they begin to make their faith their own and face challenges along the way. I thank God for all He is doing in GodZone and would appreciate you joining me in praying that God will continue to grow this work and that Trinity would continue to be a family, where all are welcome.

Trinity Tots

Trinity Tots is our weekly playgroup for preschool children and their parents and carers. We meet every Wednesday during term time in the back and middle halls of the church building. I have a brilliant and dedicated team including Linda Brady, Nikki Hall, Anne Linley, Irene Woosnam and Angela Roach. I am so grateful for their commitment and enthusiasm and the effort they have made to develop relationships with the families that attend.

Each week the halls are set up with a range of toys and activities to cover all areas of development. We have quiet areas where children can enjoy a book, and areas where children can develop their imagination through role play and small-world play. The back hall is our messy area where children can explore the craft table, sand, water and other sensory activities such as the rainbow rice, as well as ride bikes and use the climbing frame. Halfway through the session the children enjoy a drink and snack, while the adults have a much-needed cup of tea or coffee and a chat. We finish each session with a song time and bubbles, which is enjoyed by all!

Each of our sessions are booked online by our families; this means that although we have our regular returning families, we often have new people come along. We have seen a large number of new families and I also feel this year has been an important one in developing our relationships with our existing families. We have been able to get to know their stories a little more and also to offer practical and prayer support on a number of occasions. We are keen to develop an environment where everyone feels welcome when they come through the door and we try our best to ensure one of the team chats to each family at some point during the session.

Please continue to pray for Trinity Tots, the team and our families. Pray for the development of relationships with all who attend and for opportunities to have meaningful conversations. We would love to see some of our families begin to regularly attend Trinity on a Sunday, although we recognise the importance of sowing seeds in their minds through interaction with our church family in this group.

Administration

I started my role as Trinity's Church Administrator in December 2023 and I am very grateful for the warm welcome I have received. A special thank you goes to Kerry O'Sullivan and Geraldine Alliston who have patiently answered all my questions. I work three days a week, usually Monday, Tuesday, Thursday 8:30am – 4:30pm. I am responsible for production of our weekly newsletter, maintaining ChurchSuite and the church diary, minuting Church Members' and Deacons' Meetings, maintaining the website and editing the Annual Report. I am also involved in some building and maintenance tasks. I liaise with the Charity Commission and the Baptist Union to ensure we have submitted all the annual information they require.

I am working with Andy and Karen Thatcher, an external communications consultant, on implementing the communications review. This has internal and external elements, and includes building a firm foundation for Trinity's ChurchSuite. This is our database of members and friends and provides a central hub for contact details, our calendar, rotas, registers of attendance for Godzone and YP. Please contact me if you have any questions or are having trouble accessing information.

My role includes some aspects of building maintenance, including fire alarm checks and contract management. As part of this I am conducting a key holder review to make sure that we have a correct record of all the current key holders, that they are currently involved in a ministry for which they need keys, and that they have acknowledged the policies.

As staff, we meet together each Tuesday morning for a short devotional and to pray together. This is a good opportunity to check in as a team, and allows me to gather items of prayer and praise, or notices for the newsletter. If you have something to include in the newsletter, please email me by Thursday afternoon each week.

Building and Maintenance

This year has seen the long overdue upgrade of the church office. This included damp proofing and insulation works on some walls, redecorations, new carpeting and the installation of low-energy lighting as well as a wall-mounted fan heater. The work was successfully completed by PBL Group, which undertook the work at the manse last year and which was the most competitively priced of the firms we approached for the work in the church office. Thanks to Simon Davidson for managing the works on site while Dave Camp was on holiday.

We also undertook repairs to the manse (75 Standard Road), including repairing the conservatory roof. It is likely that the whole conservatory will need replacing in the course of time, given its age, and this is something that the church should ideally be saving towards.

Likewise, there will be some more significant works required to the second manse (75A Standard Road) in the course of time, including repairing and updating the under-floor heating and the boiler system. Some of this work is quite intrusive and so the timing of these works needs carefully considering.

The only works required at the chapel this year were replacing multiple light fittings that had failed, as well as getting the gutters cleared. There is some damage to the guttering which will need to be fixed in due course, but given the height involved, this is not a simple or cheap job! We hope to sort this matter out over the summer months.

If you see any required repairs around the chapel, please do let me know, or another member of the Diaconate. I do find this very helpful as keeping an account of all 3 buildings can be a challenge!

I wish to thank Dave Camp and Rob Kemp for their help with building matters. I find their help incredibly valuable. If any members of the fellowship feel they have expertise or time to share with the church to help look after the buildings God has placed in our care, please do contact me.

Health and Safety

I would like to start by thanking Dave Camp and Rob Kemp for their invaluable help in this area. If you have expertise in matters of health and safety, which you feel could benefit the church, please do contact me.

The actions taken this year were simply repairs to fixings and fittings that had failed, as well as annual maintenance. The fire detection system was tested and the remedial works required were completed. This included replacing out of date fire extinguishers, fixing emergency lighting that had failed, and replacing the kitchen door-stop so that it will automatically close in the event of a fire alarm. Where appropriate, light fittings were changed to fire-rated light fittings.

I would like to thank Paul and Tracy Sydee, who have taken on the role of keeping the outside of the building clean and tidy. This also included clearing moss and debris from the fire escape.

Time ran away with us in organising a fire drill, but it is our intention to attempt this in 2024, aiming to minimise disruption to a worship service whilst also looking to undertake a drill when the church is well attended.

Adhering to Health and Safety requirements is the responsibility of all members at Trinity, and so if you see any issue, or behaviour, that you feel compromises the safety of the church or attendees, please do contact myself or another member of the Diaconate.

Safeguarding

We take Safeguarding very seriously at Trinity as we want to make sure we keep our children, young people and vulnerable adults safe from harm as far as it is in our power to do so. This applies to all activities in church, on trips, and during any social media communications.

Updated Safeguarding Guidelines: The guidelines that accompany our Safeguarding policy have been updated this year and have been reviewed on an annual basis. These are available to all DBS-checked adults to help them understand how child safeguarding works at Trinity and what to look out for to keep children and young people safe.

This year, with the agreement of the church membership, we have changed the procedures in church for reviewing the policy. It will now be reviewed by key stakeholders in Safeguarding. This includes the Designated Safeguarding Persons, the Safeguarding Trustee, along with key Trinity staff.

GodZone Visits: Etty Haworth and Debs Harmer have visited and reviewed the teaching and safeguarding practices within each GodZone team over this year.

Safeguarding Children Training: Awareness of the importance of safeguarding, and everyone's shared responsibility for the safeguarding of children and young people, is shared with the church during the yearly Commissioning Service. In addition, refresher safeguarding training for all those leading and helping in children and young person groups will take place in May.

DBS Checks: Kerry O'Sullivan, Andy Banks, Alice Costar and Nikki Hall have been carrying out the DBS checks for all our children's and youth workers. Some of these have been in person and some via Zoom. All leaders and helpers have current DBS checks.

Designated Persons for Safeguarding: Martin Sansom and Joy Sanger continue to be our Designated Persons for Safeguarding, for which we thank them. They are independent of the workers and if ever a safeguarding need arises, they can be contacted for advice. Please remember that the safety of our children is our responsibility of all of us. If you have a concern, please speak to Martin or Joy.

With the increase in the numbers attending our children's and young people's groups we are currently in the process of adding a third Designated Safeguarding Person to the team. We are also developing a dedicated email address for the safeguarding leads that can be used for reporting any concerns.

Safeguarding Adults at Risk: The Church has a comprehensive Safeguarding Adults at Risk Policy and set of guidelines, which is reviewed regularly. Training in this will form part of the new training that will be given to all those involved in pastoral care. Our Designated Persons for Safeguarding serve both children and adults at risk.

Safeguarding Trustee: Etty Haworth continues to be the Safeguarding Trustee on the diaconate. She has over three years' experience in school safeguarding and is trained as a Designated Safeguarding Lead, with a Level 3 Safeguarding for Education award.

Youth

Trinity young people's group (Trinity YP) provides a comprehensive youth programme for teenagers aged 13 to 18. The youngsters we support are from 24 families in the fellowship. Our aim is to provide a safe and supportive space in which our youngsters can grow into well rounded adults. Helping each youth to develop a personal faith and commitment to Jesus as their Lord and Saviour underpins all that we do.

The committed team leaders, working together to deliver interesting and relevant content to our brilliant YP, are: Josh Dixon, Prince Dumi, Lizzie Hall, Elaine Mason, Jessie Osei, Lorraine Sansom, Jack Sydee, and Emmanuel Wachira. We also welcomed Adubea Baidoo to the team in September.

We would also like to thank the helpers from the fellowship without whom we would not have been able to deliver YP Friday activities. These include Angela and Gareth Roach, Andy Banks, Linda Brady, Caz Kirby-Smith, Jill Holland and Ciku Nyandusi.

Friday and Sunday programmes

YP Fridays is headed by Prince Dumi and Jack Sydee. It meets on the first three weeks in each month. On the 4th Friday, the youth are encouraged to organise their own activities. A core group of about six regularly come to YP Fridays to enjoy the many different activities, which include games, cooking, fun team challenges and the opportunity to socialise.

The Sunday teaching programme continues to be varied and relevant with input from YP leaders, guest speakers and some of our past and present YP. The topics covered reflect the aim of the YP team to equip our youngsters to live out their faith in their everyday life. The interactive group activities and discussions are bible based and contemporary. The youth freely voice their opinions and ask great questions. As well as sessions on biblical teaching, we have presented sessions on mental and spiritual wellbeing, asking questions such as 'Lord, who do you say I am?' and looking at the role of doubt in building faith. Other session topics have included peer pressure, the Christian view on money, and the transition from home to university / work. More recently, we have tackled big issue topics on sex and marriage – different relationships from a Christian perspective. On the theme of living out our faith in the real world, guest speakers have shared their experiences of working in Christian organisations, such as London City Mission, International Justice Mission, the Salvation Army and Evergreen Care.

The numbers attending on a Sunday continue to increase from a core group of 10 to about 16. We are expecting these numbers to increase again as there are a significant number of teenagers due to join us from Delta in September.

Thanks and Prayer Needs

We recognise the unique position of the YP work in our church community, and its importance in the lives of our youth. Your prayers for the teenagers and for the team are essential. We thank God for the recruitment of a new Youth Leader; the booking we have secured for the YP weekend away in September; and the past YP members who have returned to share their experiences of living as a Christian at university / work.

We ask for prayer that the process of the new Youth Leader joining us would be smooth; for an increase in the number of YP coming, especially on Fridays; and for additional leaders to join the team. Looking further into the future, we ask for prayer for the planning of the YP weekend away; for those taking examinations this year; and those who will be leaving YP to start higher education / work.

Oasis

Oasis is Trinity's coffee morning. We are open on Tuesdays between 10:30am – 12pm. We have a great team of volunteers who take on various roles: baking, serving, washing up and clearing away.

Jan and I hope that Oasis provides a calm, caring environment where you can just sit and enjoy a drink and homemade cake or join in on catching up on news or general chat. We also hope to offer support if needed. We have a few non-Trinity regulars.

We took the decision to move Oasis from the chapel into the middle hall. We have never regained our pre-COVID numbers and the middle hall provides a much cosier atmosphere. It also makes the logistics of running Oasis much easier. All the money raised is given to the <u>Foodbank</u>, and this last year we have donated £1,520.

Outreach and Evangelism

"Devote yourselves to prayer, being watchful and thankful. And pray for us, too, that God may open a door for our message, so that we may proclaim the mystery of Christ, for which I am in chains. Pray that I may proclaim it clearly, as I should. Be wise in the way you act towards outsiders; make the most of every opportunity. Let your conversation be always full of grace, seasoned with salt, so that you may know how to answer everyone." (Colossians 4:2-6).

Even when in prison, Paul's overwhelming passion was to spread the gospel of Jesus Christ. To that end: he devoted his prayers and sought the *devoted* prayers of others (vv.2-3); he sought to hone his presentation skills to make the gospel as *clear* and easy to understand for outsiders as possible (v.4); he urged *wise living* (v.5), *gracious speech* (v.6) and the insight to be able to "make the *most of every opportunity*" (v.5). Everything he was and did was orientated to make the gospel of Jesus Christ as attractive as possible, without compromising its truth. In our freedom, should we have a lesser goal?

This year we consolidated a number of outreach initiatives. <u>Trinity Tots</u> continues to be highly sought-after, with some really meaningful conversations with some of the parents; Oasis has made a successful transition to the middle hall, which has benefitted the sense of fellowship; and we continue to offer our buildings to enable the ministries of <u>Foodbank</u>, <u>Bexley Winter Shelter</u> and Street Pastors (see separate reports, where given).

Our services are a very welcome fixture at St. Margaret's Residential Home in Sidcup, where we have continued to build good relationships with staff and residents (and sometimes their families). One highlight this year was seeing a significant growth of interest from one non-Christian resident before he died.

We don't know for certain what response he made to Jesus because, by that stage, he was unable to articulate a clear thought pattern, but we were able to commit him to God's mercy with more hope than we would have had a year ago. This shows the value of this work. Our thanks to the dedicated team of speakers, musicians, and befrienders. We have lost a couple of team members, so we would value others joining the ministry, especially musicians who could lead the worship sometimes.

Our Alpha Course this year was in some ways the best yet (since we restarted them), as we began with more genuine non-Christians, alongside people from within the church who are still exploring faith. Sadly, for different reasons, most of those from outside the church did not stay for the whole course, but we did see some spiritual progress, and we trust that God will water the seeds sown. This was followed by our first Freedom in Christ course for many years, which, whilst more a discipleship than evangelistic course, has proved once again very fruitful in growing disciples.

It has also been encouraging to hear within our Sunday services about various mission initiatives including:

- Nia and Erin joining United Beach Missions in the Gower
- Charlotte's involvement with Nottingham University Christian Union Events Week
- Ilir and Helen's work in Kosova
- Andrew and Sara's ongoing ministry to refugees in Halesowen
- An update from Simon, Caroline and Isaac regarding the new direction for Azar
- An update from Dave and Michele Mahon
- Steph's presentation about International Justice Mission
- A visit from Tim Fielder from London City Mission.

A number of us participated again in the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association 'God Loves You' tour event at the Excel, where over 1,000 people made new or renewed commitments to Jesus. James Martin led our involvement in the inaugural Erith Praise open-air event in July which raised the profile of Jesus around Erith pier. Another event is in planning for this coming July. Likewise, Trinity band led the Churches Together in Bexleyheath Good Friday service in the Broadway, where we estimate over 100 Christians gathered to celebrate Jesus' death, with some (hopefully) fruitful conversations with passers-by. Thanks to James (again) and Jon & Helen French for their efforts.

Our main new outreach venture this year was to become a collection point for Operation Christmas Child. We were very encouraged by the way that the church (literally) bought into this venture in filling shoe boxes for children who would otherwise not receive a Christmas present. As far as the collection point goes, we recognise that we opened for too many hours, but we have learnt from the experience for next time and it also proved a wonderful opportunity for fellowship for those who volunteered to staff the collections.

The Outreach and Evangelism Committee continues to meet and to plan for the future. One idea in the pipeline is a specific 'Seeker Service' one Sunday morning in the Autumn, where the entire service will be geared to clearly and attractively presenting the gospel to those who may be unfamiliar with it. Please be praying ahead of time as to who you could invite to this service. A further avenue of interest is that we have been approached by the Sea Cadet unit in Trinity Place to see if we can support the spiritual aspects of their work. Isaac Givens is keen to pursue this once he is settled, so watch this space.

None of this, however, is possible without prayer backing, and it certainly will not be successful in bringing people to Jesus without prayer backing. So, even if you do not feel it is right to get involved with any of these ventures, please devote yourselves to pray that God will open a door wide for our message. We long to see his Kingdom grow and many more people come to faith and be baptised.

Foodbank

The Foodbank at Trinity is one of the four Trussell Trust Foodbanks in Bexley led by the Avery Hill Christian Fellowship. At Trinity we are open twice a week, Mondays 12pm – 2pm and Fridays 10:30am – 12:30pm. To access the Foodbank, clients need to obtain a voucher code directly from us or from one of the many agencies signed up with us, e.g., medical centres, schools, charities and churches. We have our own Trussell Trust phone line, organised by Margaret Kemp, to issue voucher codes to Bexley residents. Margaret, David Bingham and I are three of the people who cover this phone line Monday to Friday 10am – 1pm. Voucher codes can also be issued by the Citizens Advice Bureau, which operates a national free helpline Monday to Friday 9am – 5pm.

All the food / goods donated are weighed in, recorded and sorted by expiry date. My thanks go to the many hard working and committed volunteers who work tirelessly to make the two sessions at Trinity run smoothly. Anne Linley, Jean Nixon and Paul Bryant have been regular volunteers from Trinity as have been others who have helped us during our busy times of Harvest (October) and Christmas.

We collect donations from some of the local supermarkets and from the local churches. Asda and Sainsbury's in Bexleyheath, Tesco and Lidl in Welling and Tesco in Sidcup collect donations in trolleys to be found at the front of the stores. In 2023, Trinity fellowship donated a total of 947kg of food and other goods. Over £1,800 came in gifts from Oasis and individuals, for which we are very grateful.

Unfortunately, the need has now begun to outstrip the amount we receive by donations but we have been fortunate to receive grants from governmental and non-governmental institutions. This has allowed us to buy in essential food and goods as needed. The extras funds have also meant that the Bexley Foodbanks have been able to employ a Citizens Advice Bureau adviser to support and offer advice to many of our clients.

During this past year 2023 we have fulfilled a total of 1,252 food parcels helping 1,770 adults and 1,366 children, which is a 24% increase on 2022. We processed 29,808kg of food / goods and distributed 27,817kg to clients.

We are grateful for the continuing support and encouragement that we receive from Trinity. I would like to thank all the hardworking volunteers, about 20, including folks from Trinity who not only support the sessions but also collect food from supermarkets. Simon Davidson, and others outside Trinity, regularly collect food donations from the supermarkets.

I would like to express my appreciation to Gill Bates and Kate Harris, the two Bexley Foodbank managers. Trinity Foodbank would not operate without their organisational skills and tireless work. Logistically, they keep Trinity Foodbank well supplied from the Foodbank's central warehouse in Crook Log. Transporting food and goods in and out, liaising with organisations to provide different items are only a few of the essential parts of their job. Gill and Kate are also part of the Trinity Foodbank team here on Mondays and Fridays.

Bexley Winter Shelter

It's hard to believe a year has passed since I last provided an update on the activities of Bexley Winter Shelter (BWS). It's eight years since life was given to the ambition of a group of Bexley churches wanting to address homelessness in our Borough. Since its inception, a dedicated group of volunteers, mainly of the Christian faith – some of other faiths and others of no faith – have collaborated nightly during the months of January, February and March. Together, these diverse teams give up an evening a week to feed and entertain (and, sometimes, be entertained by) up to a dozen guests, all of whom are experiencing homelessness and have been temporarily put up by BWS in nearby bed and breakfast accommodation.

The Trustees unwisely congratulated themselves at their preparedness well ahead of the 2nd January 2024 start date. Little did we know that, on 20th December 2023, we would find ourselves without a venue on three evenings of the week!

We were immensely grateful, therefore, to Andy and the deacons who at very short notice agreed to increase our occupation of Trinity's kitchen and hall from one to four evenings a week.

A very positive development as we prepared for 2024 was the recruitment of our current Guest Case Worker (GCW). She has been a blessing; an answer to prayer and to the needs of our guests, in relation to both accommodation and other support needs.

This year I was struck by a younger than usual contingent of guests – two of them keen to know what it means to be Christian. Another, the same age as my daughter, had left home with nowhere to go – as her safest option. Our GCW helped her into permanent accommodation and supported her ambition to secure an apprenticeship in the film production industry. We are hopeful she will shortly be offered a place but, again, prayerful support would be welcomed.

We have definitely felt the power of your faithful prayers but please keep them coming as we look to identify and secure a permanent home for BWS. We have no affiliation with our local authority but are seeking from them the proactive support that shelters in other regions enjoy from theirs. Unfortunately, the current official stance is that Bexley has enough provision and to increase it will only encourage the homeless of other regions to seek refuge in ours. More prayer, please!

Catering

Baptist churches are often known for their catering and Trinity does not disappoint. We have many talented people who are willing to serve in a variety of ways, the most noticeable being refreshments after the Morning Service. Currently there are four teams, which means a volunteer would be called upon roughly once a month – more helpers would make it less frequent.

People also get involved in other ways: from 'Taking a Meal' to church folk; Alpha Course suppers; Alpha and Freedom in Christ Course awaydays; or baking cakes for GodZone or YP camps. There are also those who serve behind the scenes, perhaps vacuuming the back hall or mopping the floor after refreshments on Sunday, or helping to serve and clear up faithfully for each Alpha Course meeting.

Last year a new venture we trialled was 'Church Lunch at Home'. Some volunteers offered to serve lunch in their homes and others offered to eat it! This seemed to go down well with those who took part.

Trinity hosted two large events for Women of Faith, Bexley, namely the 'Be Still and Know' Conference in October and 'Advent for Women' in December. Both required helpers to offer gallons of tea and coffee, together with tasty treats. December also meant mince pies and the legendary mulled fruit punch (non-alcoholic). More mince pies were required for the GodZone Nativity and the Carols by Candlelight and Christingle services. I think we got through almost 400 in total!

On Easter Sunday we held a Bring and Share Lunch for around 90 people! The food at these events is always amazing – and plentiful. This year the variety was wonderful, with many cultural dishes in evidence. I am always very grateful for everyone who just swings into action and works so hard to make these big events possible. From setting up tables and chairs, clearing up afterwards, and helping to prepare and serve the food. A particular mention must go to those trojans who 'person' the dishwasher afterwards and get through mountains of washing-up without complaint.

Thank you to everyone who has helped over the last year in whatever capacity. You make it a pleasure to serve in this way.

Finance

We are grateful to God for all that we have and receive financially; and continue to trust and look to him to provide for our needs as a church. Praise the Lord indeed that we have exceeded our budgeted income by over £14k (£189k vs £174k). For more details, see the Financial Statement.

We are unique and blessed by Jesus as a body in his name and, like any family, the church needs money to do its job as God wills it and to take care of its members. We are very grateful to all who give generously, and continue to do so, to enable us to continue to participate in his mighty and glorious work in and through us. We know that the money coming into our church is given by all of us faithful people who long to serve God, build his kingdom and believe in our church's mission. With that in mind, we understand that we have a great responsibility to be wise with how that money is distributed and spent.

Financial Year 2024 / 2025

We have stepped out in faith to set a budgeted income from gifts and offerings of £190k, approximately a 9% increase on the set budget for 2023 / 2024, to fund the ministries that God has given us to perform and to meet our legal and organisational obligations as a charity with properties to steward. This is a stretching target, especially given the loss of a few members. However, we are confident that God will provide for all our needs and give us what he knows we need to continue his mighty work here on earth for his glory and honour.

A few ideas we hope to implement or have already implemented are listed below.

- Fellowship offering reinstated with an average collection of £477 per month in 23 / 24.
- Employment of a Youth Leader using additional funds from 2022.
- Regular support for the International Justice Mission.

Gift Aid

If you don't already do Gift Aid, and you pay tax, please do speak to me. Any gifts received under the Gift Aid system allow us to claim an extra 25% of the gift from HMRC, at no extra cost to the giver. I am happy to say that at least 90% of our income is Gift Aided.

Our sincere thanks go to those who are involved with the responsibility and hard work of maintaining and producing the finances of the church, including Daniel Kwalombota (Independent Examiner) and Isaac Amoateng who has stepped into the role of Deputy Treasurer, focusing on statutory accounts and monthly financial analysis. Also, Andy and the deacons for their help in managing the finances, particularly Isaac Osei (payroll); Ron Jones (banking); and Jon French (pensions and payroll).

Financial Statement
